Dr. Henry J. Perry, K '92, Ω February 4, 1926.

Dr. Henry Joseph Perry, K '92 passed on to the Omega Charge on February 4, 1926. Dr. Perry took his degree in medicine at Harvard University in 1896. For many years he had been on the staff of the Boston Dispensary where he had been chief of the department of dermatology. In connection with this service he developed the largest clinic of its kind in New England. Last year over 3,000 patients came under his supervision. Up to 1918, he was also on the staff of the Evangeline Booth Hospital, assistant instructor in bacteriology in the Harvard Medical School, and professor of bacteriology at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy. Since 1918, he had been associate professor of dermatology at the Tufts Medical School, in which institution he had a deep interest.

Brother Perry's avocation was ornithology. Two years ago when he was in Los Angeles, California, for two hours only, he told Dr. Bancroft, a brother Theta Delt, who was seeking to give him a good time, that the greatest pleasure he could give him was to drive him to one of the parks where he might watch the birds peculiar to Southern California.

Dr. Perry was a member of the Harvard Club of Boston and of Belmont Springs Country Club, the president of the New England Dermatological Society, and vice president of the Boston Numismatic Society; he was also a member of the Boston Philatelic Society, Massachusetts Medical Society, American Medical Association, American Urological Association, New England Urological Association, Boston Bacteriological Club, Boston Medical History Club, Nuttall Ornithological Club, Cooper Ornithological Club, Brookline Bird Club, Massachusetts Fish and Game Association, Boston Society of Natural History, Massachusetts Audubon Society, Boston Medical Library.

Brother Perry's devotion to his calling was intense. He was ever in touch with the latest ideas in medicine. He was sympathetic to the highest degree with his many patients and went beyond his strength many a time in his attention to them. They were always helped by his pleasant smile and his cheery word.

He resided at the Hotel Beaconsfield, Brookline, and had his office at 19 Bay State Road. He is survived by three children, Henry Joseph Perry, Jr., Rosamond Perry, and Freeman Perry, residing in Montreal; and a brother, Carleton A. Perry, K '97, of Needham, Mass.

Brig. Gen. Vroom, Δ '60, Ω March 18, 1926.

Brig. Gen. Peter Dumont Vroom, U. S. A., retired, of Trenton, died March 18, 1926, in Atlantic City at the age of 83. Services were held in Arlington Cemetery, Washington, at 2 P. M. March 20, 1926.

The son of Governor Peter D. Vroom, Big. Gen. Vroom, a native of Trenton, was trained for the profession of civil engineer, graduating in 1862 from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N. Y. Almost immediately after receiving his degree, he took part in the Civil War as a First Lieutenant in the First New Jersey Infantry. He resigned a year later to become a Major in the Second New Jersey Cavalry. After the war he was breveted a Colonel.
